Curriculum

Evaluation and verification of learning outcomes

The course is evaluated according to the Kirkpatrick model: it makes use of level 1 evaluation (*based on participant's satisfaction with the course*). In order to complete the course, participants have to accomplish all learning objectives, which are evaluated based on the active contribution in the residential Module, including their syndicate session and practical activities as well as on their completion of the eLearning phases: course participants finalise the autonomous knowledge units (AKUs) and pass the tests (mandatory), scoring at least 80% in the incorporated outtest/quiz. Active observation by the course director/lead instructor and feedback questionnaire filled by course

participants at the end of the course is used. **No formal verification of learning outcome is foreseen; proposed ECTS is based on participants' workload only.**
