<u>Target audience</u> Participants would normally be entry / mid- level staff from Member States (MS) and EU institutions and agencies, with some previous experience in security policy matters. Ideally, the participants should have some experience related to diplomacy or have (preferred scenario) previously attended the CSDP Orientation Course. In addition, the course is also focused on regional aspects on diplomacy and will involve speakers and participants from third countries.	<u>Aim</u> The basic course on Diplomacy for CSDP Mission will focus on a general introduction to the issues involved, aiming to familiarise the participants with the basic principles in the area of diplomacy, international strategic and diplomatic context, together with a critical assessment of the connections between diplomacy and CSDP/CFSP domain. It will also discuss new and old diplomacy, globalisation trends, the relevance and the place of public diplomacy in the context of CSDP missions, as well as introducing concepts and practices related to digital/e-diplomacy. The final goal of the Diplomatic Skills Course is to support EU Member States and EU institutions and

Evaluation and verification of learning outcomes

The course is evaluated according to the Kirkpatrick model: it makes use of *level 1 evaluation* (*based on participant's satisfaction with the course*).

In order to complete the course, participants have to accomplish all learning objectives, which are evaluated based on the active contribution in the residential Module, including their syndicate session and practical activities as well as on their completion of the eLearning phases: course participants finalise the autonomous knowledge units (AKUs) and pass the tests (*mandatory*), scoring at least 80% in the incorporated out-test/quiz. Active observation by the course director/lead instructor and feedback questionnaire filled by course participants at the end of the course is used.

However, no formal verification of learning outcome is foreseen; proposed ECTS is based on participants' workload only.
