<p><u>Target audience</u></p> <p><i>Participants should be preferably senior level experts (civilian and military personnel, including civil administration and police) currently or aspiring to work in areas related to crisis management in the wider context of CFSP/CSDP, including EEAS, CSDP mission and operations, EU Delegations and European Commission, or working for other organisations in a crisis area. Priority is given to the personnel from EU Member States.</i></p>	<p><u>Aim</u></p> <p>This residential course enhances knowledge and understanding of crisis management in the context of the EU Integrated Approach to External Conflicts and Crisis. This course promotes interactive shared situational awareness collaboration and cooperation among various military and civilian actors. This course provides civilian and military senior officers with the skills and knowledge needed to perform their duties in the Common Security and Defence Policy (CSDP) area.</p>

Evaluation and verification of learning outcomes

The course is evaluated according to the Kirkpatrick model: it makes use of level 1 evaluation (*based on participant's satisfaction with the course*). In order to complete the course, participants have to accomplish all learning objectives, which are evaluated based on the active contribution in the residential Module, including their syndicate session and practical activities as well as on their completion of the eLearning phases: course participants finalise the autonomous knowledge units (AKUs) and pass the tests (mandatory), scoring at least 80% in the incorporated out-test/quiz. Active observation by the course director/lead instructor and feedback questionnaire filled by course participants at the end of the course is used. **No formal verification of learning outcome is foreseen; proposed ECTS is based on participants' workload only.**
