Aim

The security in the Black Sea Region. Shared Challenges, Sustainable Future program is an interactive and practical training program, ideal for promising young leaders and junior managers in security, diplomacy and intelligence. This advanced professional course examines the evolving security dynamics in the Black Sea Region against the backdrop of the war in Ukraine and shifting geopolitical alignments. The course provides a comprehensive analysis of emerging security challenges, regional power dynamics, and strategies for building sustainable security frameworks in this critical area. The course is also designed to enhance analytic and forward thinking skills, as well as joint leadership capacities focusing on the challenges specific to security and intelligence organizations transformation in the 21st century.

Throughout the course, under the supervision of expert tutors and facilitators, participants are expected to conduct a practical, interactive exercise addressing challenges to security in the Black Sea Region, by incorporating future-making scenarios, predictive analysis, conflict resolution and mediation, negotiation skills etc.

Evaluation and verification of learning outcomes

The course is evaluated according to the Kirkpatrick model: it makes use of *level 1 evaluation* (based on participant's satisfaction with the course).

In order to complete the course, participants have to accomplish all learning objectives, which are evaluated based on the active contribution in the residential Module, including their syndicate session and practical activities (24 hours total) as well as on their completion of the eLearning phases: course participants finalise the autonomous knowledge units (AKUs) and pass the tests (*mandatory*), scoring at least 80% in the incorporated out-test/quiz (26 hours total). Active observation by the course director/lead instructor and feedback questionnaire filled by course participants at the end of the course is used.

However, no formal verification of learning outcome is foreseen; proposed ECTS is based on participants' workload only.

Methodology

Pre-course questionnaire on learning expectations and possible briefing topic from the specific area of expertise may be used.

All course participants have to prepare for the residential module by going through the relevant eLearning preparatory phase, which is mandatory.

Depending on different audiences, the course can be organised as a familiarisation course or advanced course, with a corresponding change in focus regarding concepts, policies, planning and implementation.

Additional information

The Chatham House Rule is applied during all residential modules of the HLC: "participants are free to use the information received, but neither the identity nor the affiliation of the speaker(s), nor that of any other participant, may be revealed".

The mandatory EU security clearance to "Confidential" level should be valid for the entire duration of the HLC and participants must prove that they have an EU clearance certificate before the start of the first residential module.
