### Target audience

The participants will predominantly come from EU institutions, its Member States, EU candidate countries and EU partners. Limited numbers of slots will be attributed to participants from UN and OSCE structures as well as to topic related training institutions.

## Open to

Participants should be working in conflict prevention, conflict management and postconflict recovery and stabilisation contexts related to the Protection of Cultural Heritage at an operative level. With regards to the integrated and holistic approach to the protection of cultural property, participants may be civilian, military or police staff.

### <u>Aim</u>

### The course aims to:

• provide the necessary knowledge about the need to protect intangible heritage in armed conflict and the post-conflict period;

• promote the importance of the protection of cultural identity vis a vis the resilience to hybrid threats;

•Identify and analyse the challenges for the protection of intangible cultural property and provide suitable tools for addressing them;

• strengthen the cooperation of a wide range of actors, including governments, civil society, international organizations and agencies and non-governmental organizations in order to achieve an integrated and holistic approach to this subject;

• support cooperation with other international actors in this field, such as the UN, OSCE and context-related training institutions.

• provide the opportunity to create a network of people working in the field of intangible heritage protection.
