Invitation to the

Pre-deployment Training for CSDP Missions and Operations

<u>Brussels, 29 September – 3 October 2025</u>

(Activity Number 25-26/33/1)

The Geneva Centre for Security Policy (GCSP) and the European Security and Defence College (ESDC) are co-organising pre-deployment training for CSDP missions and operations (PDT) from 29 September to 03 October 2025, in Brussels.

The Pre-Deployment Training (PDT) aims to increase the effectiveness of CSDP missions and operations. It aims at streamlining the CSDP management culture and to ensure that deploying personnel is equipped with the relevant knowledge and skills necessary to become operational as soon as possible in order to contribute to the implementation of the mission mandate.

The PDT is exclusively aimed for personnel already selected by a CSDP mission/operation. Upon availability of seats, the course is open for candidates in Member States working on CSDP missions or operations matters.

According to the "EU Policy on Training for CSDP" appropriate training is a mandatory prerequisite prior to deployment to ensure that personnel are adequately prepared so that they can integrate into mission life and be operational as soon as possible upon deployment.

The PDT course enhances the overall understanding of participants about the functioning principles of CSDP missions; provides an insight into the latest policies, instruments and tools available to fulfil the mandate; depicts the mission environment; and provides a sense of common EU identity and purpose. The PDT provides as well a unique opportunity to meet your respective mission/operation Points of Contact (PoCs), to network with deploying colleagues and to get a feel of Brussels Headquarters.

Please note that the PDT complements national preparatory generic and specific training activities and does not substitute national preparatory training that remains in the hands of the respective Member State.

The ESDC is committed to an inclusive, gender-sensitive and discrimination-free environment. Only in an inclusive environment can all people, and therefore the ESDC





and its partners, realise their true potential. We therefore particularly encourage those applicants who are likely to be underrepresented to apply.

Annex 1: Administrative information

- Target Audience: The course is open to civilian, military and police personnel from EU Member States and from CSDP missions/operations. The course is also open to third countries that are seconding personnel to CSDP missions. The PDT is exclusively intended for personnel already selected by a CSDP mission/operation.
- How to apply: Applications are to be filed via the ESDC secure internet system ENLIST, by designated nominators, under https://esdc.europa.eu/enlist/login, no later than 02 September 2025. A list with relevant ENLIST nominators can be found on the ESDC website at https://esdc.europa.eu/nominators/.
- Registration: Registration will not be final until confirmed by the ESDC Secretariat. When the participants' list is finalised, the course administration will be in contact with selected participants and provide more detailed information on the course.
- Late registration: Subject to availability of seats the course is open for late registration, please contact point of contact (details below).
- **Seats:** A maximum of 20 participants.
- Location: The course will be held residentially in <u>Belmont Building, Rue D'Arlon</u>
 <u>62, Brussels.</u> The location is in close vicinity of the EU institutions.
- Language: Working language is English, without translation.
- **Cost:** The sending authorities will cover all costs for travelling, accommodation and food.
- E-learning: The residential part of the course will be preceded by mandatory elearning modules which must be finalised before start of the residential part of the course; detailed information will be shared with selected participants.
- Attendance: The participant's attendance during the course is mandatory on all days. A certificate will be awarded on the last day to those course participants who have completed the full course, including the mandatory e-Learning modules.

Target Audience

Seconded and international contracted staff who have been selected to be deployed to a CSDP mission/operation.

This includes staff from non-EU Member States and NATO contributing to CSDP missions and operations.

<u>Aim</u>

The pre-deployment training – *complemented by the mission's induction training* upon arrival in the field – aims to increase the effectiveness of the mission/operation. PDT is designed to uniform the management culture of the CSDP missions and to ensure that participants are adequately prepared so that they can be integrate into mission life and be operational as soon as possible upon deployment.

The course enhances participants' overall understanding of CSDP missions' functioning principles, provide an insight into the latest policies, instruments and tools available to fulfil the mandate, depict the mission environment and provide a sense of common EU identity and purpose.
